ASSETS & SERVICES WORKING GROUP MEETING

The Group met on Tuesday beginning with some of the details for managing events in Ventnor Park, including an Application Form, a set of Terms and Conditions for its use and related charges. Next was a discussion of the consequences for Ventnor Haven of the Isle of Wight Council's decision to sell Ryde Harbour to the Town Council. Other items were the Benches in Ventnor Park, the replacement of the turn left sign at Boniface Fields and a report from the Mayor on the recent meeting he, Councillor Stephen Cockett and I had with County Councillor Ian Ward.

MEETING WITH THE ISLAND'S MP

I joined 23 other representatives of the Island's Town & Parish Councils for the fortnightly meeting Bob Seely



holds for us. He openened with reporting back on progress with issues raised at the last meeting, so we heard that he had as yet no response from government about virtual

meetings after 7 May nor from the Isle of Wight Council on why there was no Precept related grant to Town & Parish Councils this year. Subjects raised by the representatives included the possibility of the next America's Cup coming to the Island, the future development of Cowes Harbour, the proposal for a development in the Bembridge Woods, Business Rates and access to GPs.

FOOTPATH RE-OPENS

An email from the Isle of Wight Council informed us that the footpath from Salisbury Gardens to the Eastern Esplanade Car Park is now safe to use and all barriers have been removed.



NEW FUNDING

The week brought good news for our work to support the town's residents trapped in poverty. First came funding of £2,5000 from the Clinically Extremely Vulnerable Support grant the Isle of Wight Council has received from government 'to help those vulnerable individuals who are struggling with day to day needs and wellbeing due to COVID-19.' Then came the welcome news that our application to the Isle of Wight Council's funding from the government's COVID Winter Grant Scheme had been successful, providing a further £5,000 for local residents' support.
