ASSETS & SERVICES WORKING GROUP MEETING

The Group's virtual meeting on Tuesday morning dealt with a full Agenda. Item one included an update on the ongoing repairs to the Salisbury Gardens' roof and the need to get a revaluation of our many assets for insurance purposes. We then agreed on the trimming of the lower branches on some of the Boniface Fields' Trees and the purchase of a second hand mower for the Putting Green. Signage in the Park came next with a proposal from our Business Development Manager that we will add to the February Town Council meeting Agenda. The impact of Wight Fibre on the town also occupied us and we were pleased to hear that they had agreed to a meeting with us. The unsuitable placement of the Electric Charging point in Victoria Street was discussed again together with the Isle of Wight Council's plans for future facilities. The potential for further development of the area around the Paddling Pool will be further looked into and our final item was a question by Isle of Wight Council about a possible pop-up shop near the Wheelers Bay area.

PLANNING COMMITTEE MEETING

The Committee had five applications to consider at its meeting on Tuesday. It decided to recommend the withdrawal of the application for the Time & Tide Bell's installation to the east of the Haven due to questions about *its location, health and safety of the public and the effect of prevailing winds and storms*. It strongly supported the application for a single storey extension and detached garage at 2 Rew Farm Cottages and supported development at Bonchurch's Shore House. It was, however, unable to support significant development at The Eyrie on Hambrough Road *without evidence of the structural engineer's report related to loading and potential downmovement, due to historical ground movement nearby.* Declarations of Interest by Committee Members left it inquorate for the application of Belgrave Road's St Andrews.

MAYORS' SURGERY

Our Mayor and Deputy Mayor will be happy to meet with residents at our Salisbury Gardens' Green Room from 6pm on Wednesday evening.

THREE WEEK HIGH STREET CLOSURE

In a meeting with Wightfibre last week they told us that their work in the Town requires a threeweek hard closure of the High



Street from 1 March with pedestrian access only. They readily offered to arrange a

public meeting for discussion of the many issues that raises for residents and traders and that will take place tomorrow (Tuesday) at St Catherine's Church from 4.30pm to 6.30pm.

FILMING IN VENTNOR

There will be some disruptions to the town this week with various short road closures throughout the week including the High Street from Church Street to Springhill on Friday to allow filming for a major film. The Town Council has had no involvement in these arrangements and will not benefit from them. We only learned the final details on Thursday thanks to the company providing the closure signage. Safety project, the Town Council is keen to restore it for the coming season. To make that possible we need to recruit two new part-time staff each
