WELLBEING CAFÉ'S LATEST TRIP

Organised by its Co-ordinator Terri, the Wellbeing Café members had a wonderful day out at the Isle of

Wight Steam Railway at Havenstreet last Saturday. Members dodged the initial rain



showers to enjoy rides on the steam train, explore The Train Story – an undercover, interactive experience and exhibition of over 150 years of railway history, including Victorian and Edwardian carriages – and finally to watch flying displays of the Haven Falconry's birds of prey. Thanks go to Dave Forrester and team who privately-own the open-top bus and kindly provided this transport for the day, driven by volunteer John Killick.

FUNDING OUR COMMUNITY PANTRY

The Community Pantry's initial funding through the government's Housing Support Fund's first half year



was for 6 months. The second half year funding has now been announced and in addition to

excluding support for staffing there is a requirement that the food allocation of £10,000 is only available through a company called Bidfood, owned by the South African-based £5 billion pa turnover international trading company Bidvest.

That's a serious issue because we understand prices at Bid Food are considerably higher than purchasing items locally eg a kilo of mince is £14.00 at Bidfood compared to £4.00 at our local Co-op. Other examples: smallest block of cheese is 2.5 kg and worth about £23.00, there is no small tins of fruits, soups, squash or any other essentials required to stock our pantry and all fresh fruits and vegetables are well over any local shop value.

The threat is all the greater because the Pantry is so successful with 200 Members paying £5 weekly for £15 of food and staffing is essential.

MACNAUGHTON-HOWE FESTIVAL 2022

The community inspired arts and crafts, horticultural, and performing arts festival for all ages is in action this coming weekend at St Catherine's Church. Opening times are Friday 1pm to 5pm and Saturday 10am to 4pm.

The Festival has its roots in a bequest of £2,000 for cultural activities in the town by Mrs D A MacNaughton following her death in 1956; she was a daughter of local ironmonger Alfred Scott, based in the shop now occupied by Hursts today. Rene Howe was a volunteer from the earliest days of the Festival and, on her death in 2001, left another substantial donation to support it.
