PANTRY FUNDING MAKES PRIVATE EYE

The decision of the Isle of Wight Council to provide the second six-months funding of our Community Pantry only through a contract with Bidfood is covered in this week's Private Eye magazine: the full story is available

But their latest allocations must apparently be spent with the profit-seeking Bidfood, a subsidiary of Bidcore Group, listed in South Africa. It recorded record profits last year of 7.6bn rand (£370m) — boosted no doubt by numerous government and local authority contracts for provision to hospitals, schools and the army. Pantry volunteers are dismayed and angry because as the Covid-19 food boxes illustrated, they could buy double the amount of food if left to "forage" locally for the best daily deals. trading company Bidvest and that's a serious issue because we understand prices at Bid Food are considerably higher than purchasing items locally eg a kilo of mince is £14.00 at Bidfood compared to £4.00 at our local Co-op ...there are no small tins of fruits, soups, squash or any other essentials required to stock our pantry and all fresh fruits and vegetables are well over any local shop value.
