HIGH SHERIFF'S AWARDS

The Island's High Sheriff Kay Marriott came to our Green Room at the start of Monday's Town Council Meeting to make her Awards to three of the town's local organisations. They are made each year through public nominations as a mark of distinction and

recognition given to public servants, individual volunteers or community groups based on the Isle of Wight, who are making a significant contribution to their communities.

MONDAY'S TOWN COUNCIL MEETING

The Town Council Meeting's first Agenda item was, as usual, to receive the monthly Finance report that was summarised in last month's Column. After that the Council formally approved the current framework for the Management of Financial Risk.
