## TIMING FOR A CHANGE ...

Tonight's Extraordinary Meeting of the Town Council has a single item Agenda: to agree the Recruitment Process for the town's new Town Clerk recommended by its HR Committee on 17 March and published in last week's Clerk's Column.

The recommendations include a Schedule for the process with adverts out from 10 April, an application deadline of 3 May and confirmation of appointment at a Town Council meeting on 22 May.

# PLANNING COMMITTEE MEETING

The Committee had six applications to assess at its meeting on Tuesday. It supported four of them, saw no objection to another and objected to just one: the proposed workshop/art studio to be built on top of an existing garage building at St Michaels Kings Bay Road was objected to because of *poor design, overbearing mass and detrimental impact on the area and the street scene.* The application for replacement windows on the ground floor, hard landscaped area forming steps and seating areas at The Dell in Bonchurch's The Pitts was supported as a *well considered and sensitive application for Listed Building Consent.* 

## SUSTAINABILITY & BIODIVERSITY GROUP

This Working Group had its monthly meeting on Tuesday morning and opened as usual with its commitment to see a reduction in the carbon footprint of the Town Council's Assets & Estate. It then agreed to postpone its draught-proofing project to the autumn as temperatures are now rising. The importance of the £2 per journey bus fare was stressed and the Group's determination to progress the extension of wild flower areas in the town was returned to. The final *Anything Else* slot agreed a proposal that the Group should develop a Work Plan and welcomed news of progress with the Time and Tide Bell project.
