TOWN MEETING 2023

The annual Town Meeting at St Catherine's Church on this evening included an usual a celebration of the town's remarkable voluntary sector with members from six organisations giving 5-minute summaries of their organisation's work: Corine Moore – Living Well and Early Help; Mark Jeffries – Friends of Ventnor Cemetery; Val Pitts – Friends of Botanic Gardens; Phil Warren – Ventnor Enhancement Fund; and James Potter – Coastguard.

Our thanks to the other seven organisations offering to tell their story but willing to give way this year to prevent the meeting lasting too long: Teresa Preston – Ventnor Carnival; Roy George – Ventnor Community Foodbank; Leigh Geddes-Ventnor Community Shed; Joyce Milford – Baby Box; Marzena Turner – Ventnor Community Pantry; Lesley Telford – Ventnor Heritage Museum; and Terri Exopite – Well-being Café.

David George, a Member of the Town Council from 2009-2013 and Deputy Mayor repeated in the Open Forum his statement 'someone in this council stands accused of bullying two women and they remain a councillor' and asked Members if such allegations had been made against them.

ANNUAL TOWN COUNCIL MEETING

The Annual Town meeting was as usual preceded by the Annual Town Council Meeting with the first



item being the appointment of Councillor Steve Cooper as Town Mayor until the Annual Town Council Meeting of 2024. Councillor Mark Jefferies was elected as Deputy

Mayor for the same period before the Meeting went on to appoint Chairs and Members of its Planning, HR and Community Support Fund Committees and the members of its Assets & Services, Community Development and Sustainability & Biodiversity Working Groups.

The Meeting also had to record that the Town Council no longer qualifies for the use of the General Power of Competence as it currently does not have the required two-thirds of its Members that have been elected rather than co-opted.
