Especially to the many volunteers that support the event and you, the community for the endless commitment to this historical attraction the town has offered now for well over a hundred years or more.



Councillors serving on the Biodiversity working group had a vision of a community orchard and after some challenges, we can now announce that work begins on the site of the proposed orchard in Steephill Down Road shortly. Watch out for the updates and official opening in the coming months.



The Council are keenly aware of the concerns residents had over the works currently taking place on our seafront area, with the sea defenses and replacement of the cascade's railings. These works are not within our control and are necessary. We do recognise that communications and resident input could and I would say , should have been better organised. To this end, I have sought improvements to the way town and parish councils are informed by the IOW Council of planned works in Island towns, I will provide you all with updates as and when formal progress is achieved. In the meantime please be vigilant of your and others safety when accessing the seafront areas. Construction sites are inherently dangerous locations and should not be entered without permission. We anticipate , by next summer the whole sea frontage should be unhindered by works.



The council has engaged with Better Days Café to formalized an improved working partnership between the two organisations. We would also like to recognise the fantastic work that our own Wellbeing cafe does in helping support individuals and groups in the community. Baby Box and the Food Bank /Pantry continue to provide much needed support to residents. A need now affecting not just the vulnerable or low paid, but everyday families who have been hit by the cost-of-living crisis. We thank all community groups within our town for the hard and dedicated work you put into helping people. Other groups will be featured in future editions of the newsletter.



I have recently met with the helpful team driving the skatepark relocation. The Isle of Wight council have informed VTC that the current skatepark is unsuitable for upgrade, owing in part to the land being required for future sea defences. The IWC have provisionally offered two alternative sites, land below Dudley Road car park and the other on land opposite the outdoor gym at the upper levels of Ventnor Park. Both sites offer challenges and concerns. I suggested a third site in upper Ventnor for consideration. It is now in the very early stages of the planning phase and please be assured the community will be able to contribute views, via consultation meetings when plans progress.



The position of Mayor does not really entail any special powers other than chairing the council meetings and being the council's representative at local events and official occasions. I have deliberately shared with the Deputy Mayor and other councillors, as in my eyes it is not about the position of Mayor, but the collective. Other councillors, staff and most importantly, you the community, are the ones who create success. However, it is a leadership role, and I very much want residents to be part of the decision-making process by contributing your experience and knowledge.

Ventnor Town Council's vision is about partnership working, we can and should develop a strategic vision for our local Community. We can build a strong vision based on our unique Ventnor identity and the priorities of the residents Lowtherville, Ventnor Town, St Lawrence and Bonchurch. Partnership working, I believe, should not just be about delivery, but dialogue with you and your involvement in decision making. We need clear goals and narratives on how best to meet our collective needs; This will create the foundation for a successful future

Please do let me have your thoughts and ideas going forward, no matter how big or small. Would you value regular surgeries with myself and other councillors? Would you attend topic meetings with us, if invited? Would you like more public meetings on the issues that concern you most within our town and community? I want to hear from you. Let me have your thoughts, this is your council, and you drive its

Ventnor's Wellbeing Café is an informal gathering of people living with anxiety who are keen to take steps forward in managing their mental health, their overall well-being and in making purpose and positivity a part of each day.

Our group meets four times weekly at Salisbury Gardens, Dudley Road in the ground floor community space known as the Green Room. We meet on Monday and Wednesday, 10.00-14.00 and on Tuesday and Friday 12.00-16.00, with a free lunch provided on these two days.

Anyone can struggle with the common, everyday mental health issues of anxiety, depression, social isolation, PTSD, and agoraphobia. As a mutually supportive and non-judgmental group, when someone finds they are having a difficult day, we offer whatever we can to help get them back on their feet. However, please know we welcome anyone who might like to drop by for a cuppa and a chat, knowing you will feel at ease and right at home. Our membership consists of over100 unique individuals of all ages.

A sensitive supportive group consisting of people from Ventnor and further afield. Café members are always welcoming, unified in their sincere support to help one another and proud of decisions made collectively. As we fully understand what it is like to feel isolated, to be thought of as different and well know the pain of loneliness and abandonment, we offer the much-needed comfort and compassion gained from personal experience.

We always play bingo and there is a plentiful supply of drinks and biscuits and sometimes cake! The group likes to be active, and our next outing is on the Island Breezer to the Needles. On top of this, we often have speakers on a variety of subjects who bring ideas and suggestions that bring about lively discussions.

Due to the extensive Cascade building works this group happily moved along to Mill Bay veranda, thanks to Tracey. Each Saturday morning VTC's maintenance manager, Brian Roberts, spends time setting up the musicians. Many thanks to Brian for this.
