Cowes Library - Is open! The library resumed it's regular opening hours on Monday 2 June and the staff there are delighted to be back. Books hitting the shelves in July and August

Libraries take delivery of new books most weeks and if you want to be first in line for the latest from your favourite authors then you can reserve books in advance for just 80p each. You can do this in the library with a member of staff or via our online catalogue at **www.iow.gov.uk/thelibrary**. Look out for the monthly publication posters in libraries which show you more of the most popular titles coming out each month. Here are a few of the titles being published in July and August.

The Summer Reading Challenge has now started in all our libraries. This year's challenge is called Story Garden, so we're busy planning loads of activities about nature and gardens!

What is the Summer Reading Challenge?

The Summer Reading Challenge challenges children to read six books in July and August. Anyone taking the challenge gets a colourful fold-out poster. As they read books over the summer, they collect stickers, along with other goodies. When they've read six books, they get a medal and a certificate.

What are the benefits of the challenge?

Well, first of all, it's fun! But there's a serious reason behind it too. In 2024, only a third of children said that they enjoyed reading. Left to themselves, lots of children wouldn't touch a book over the holidays, and their reading abilities have dropped by September. The challenge keeps them reading and can help prevent this "summer dip."

A key principle is that children choose their own books. They can be any books they like. It doesn't matter if they're "too easy" or if they've read them before. They can be non-fiction or even audio books. This free choice can make such a difference to children. Every year we hear from delighted parents whose children have gone from hating books to loving them over the course of one summer.

How do children join?

The challenge runs in all island libraries, including the community libraries. Children aged 4 and over can join the main challenge, but there's also a mini-challenge for children aged 3 and under, with age-appropriate rewards.

The challenge starts on Saturday 5 July and runs until Saturday 6 September. It's free to join – just pop into any library and ask!





Tilt by Emma Pattee

This is a thrilling literary debut about survival, that manages to combine all the best elements of a thriller at the same time as examining a marriage and the prospect of motherhood.

When we meet Annie the protagonist of the novel, she is 37 weeks pregnant and belatedly shopping for a crib in IKEA. When an earthquake hits, everything is thrown into chaos and the only thing Annie can do to survive is walk - walk to find her husband and get herself and her unborn baby to safety.

As she walks, the narrative splits into alternating chapters of past and present and we learn the origins of her relationship with her husband and just how far she will go to survive.

At just under 250 pages, this is a short but impactful novel about love, life and and what we do when disaster strikes. **LE**

When did you start working for the Library Service?

I started as a Saturday assistant back in July 2000, before becoming a relief library assistant (covering for annual leave or sickness) which I did while I was still at college and here I am many years later having gradually moved up the ranks!

What is your current role in the Library Service?

I'm the Supervisor of Cowes Library, a role I've recently taken over from Joyce Blizzard who showed me the ropes when I first began working for the library service. I work with an excellent team and whilst I have many parts to my working life and have been involved in various aspects of the service across the Island, Cowes Library feels like home.

What is your favourite part of the job?

For me, my favourite part of the job is helping people. Whether that's through using my own experience of having dyslexia as a way of helping people with their own, researching local history or coming up with something to inspire children and families to be creative and have fun.

What is one aspect of the Library Service that you think not enough people know about?

I'd say the main aspect of the library service that some people don't know about is the free computer use that we offer - this includes free internet access (over WiFi or on our public computers) and affordable printing (just 20p per side). This service could be useful for students, jobseekers, families, businesses and many other people for a variety of reasons.

Monthly quiz nights at Freshwater Library

If you need something to look forward to and get your brain ticking over at the start of the week, then the Freshwater library monthly quiz could be for you!

The quiz was started by Freshwater library volunteer Pat Burge when restrictions were lifted at the end of lock down, with the idea of getting people together again in a safely controlled environment. Despite the need for face masks and hand sanitiser, the evenings proved to be really good fun and offered a much needed chance to socialise again.

The quiz has since established itself as a regular fixture at the library. Held on the first Monday of every month (even on Bank Holidays), there is now a 'bank' of regular teams and new people joining in all the time. Entry is cheap - just £l per person and you can book through the Friends of Freshwater Library website **https://www.fofl.co.uk/.** For anyone wishing to go solo or in a team of two, there is a separate contact email provided. On quiz night you can take along refreshments to enjoy whilst taking part and if you're on the winning team you might win your snacks for the next month's quiz, as the prize for the winners is usually something along the lines of a box of biscuits.
